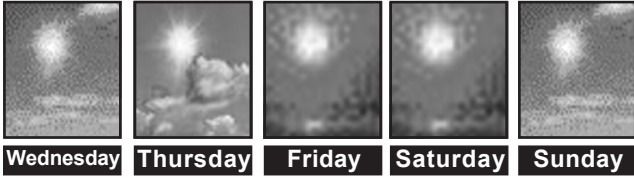

## St. Rose School Opens Doors to Recent Campus Expansion

Rev. John Beitans, Pastor of St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church, conducted a dedication ceremony on Sunday, September 26, 2010, of recently completed projects. Participating in the event were parishioners, students and family members.

In 2006, a facilities master plan identified a need for additional classroom space to enhance the school's educational programs, specifically in the areas of Art and Music instruction. A modular structure, referred to as 'The Studio', was obtained, installed and is in use for the instruction of Fine Arts, Music, Choir and Band. The project was paid for with funds from the recently completed capital campaign.

With the relocation of the Fine Arts program, the School's Technology Center has expanded to accommodate the increased use of technology and add additional workspace for students within the setting of a computer lab. Some space also became available for Language Arts.

A visit to the School's athletic field revealed newly installed goal posts for the football field. A complete renovation of the athletic fields is expected to occur in 2011.

Recent graduate William Roush was on hand to demonstrate one of his

## Franklin College Professor Publishes New Book

German native, Dr. Ralph Guentzel, associate professor of history at Franklin College, explores the culture, politics and history of west-central Europe in his new book, "Understanding 'Old Europe': An Introduction to the Culture, Politics and History of France, Germany and Austria."

Guentzel will present the lecture "Looking Across the 'Big Pond': The Culture, Politics and History of France, Germany and Austria," discussing his book with the Franklin College campus and community Tuesday, Oct. 26 at 6 p.m. in the Henderson Conference Room in the Johnson Center for Fine Arts. The lecture will be followed by a reception and book signing.

The book is published in two editions- one for the United States market and the other for the European market. It takes a look at contemporary customs and institutions such as dress codes, communication practices, patterns of work and leisure, and analyses their historical roots.

Guentzel is a native of Kassel, Germany, and has studied at Georgia-Augusta University in Goettingen and Free University in Berlin. In addition, he holds a master's and a doctoral degree in history from McGill University in Montreal, Canada.

He is chair of the history department and director of the Centre for Canadian Studies at Franklin College.

His lecture is free and no ticket is required to attend, although seating will be limited. Copies of his book may currently be purchased for \$25 in the Franklin College Bookstore and also at the event.

## Leadership Change at Habitat for Humanity

There's a change in leadership at Habitat for Humanity of Johnson County. Executive Director Rhett Cecil has accepted an offer to lead the Habitat mission in Hamilton County. The move comes in an effort to bring Cecil closer to his family and home, north of Indianapolis. According to Johnson County Board President Mike Gorman, "We are thankful for the growth and development of Habitat in Johnson County over

the past 18 months and very pleased that Rhett will continue to be part of the Habitat family."

Cecil's transition to the Habitat office in Westfield will continue through the month of October, at which time the on-going search for his successor is scheduled to be completed. During the transition, Habitat for Humanity of Johnson County will continue providing services for current and

prospective partner families, and hours of operation will remain Monday - Friday, 9 to 5 p.m.

Habitat for Humanity of Johnson County is a nonprofit Christian organization that works in partnership with families under the conviction that every person should have a simple, decent place to live in safety and dignity. Established in June of 2006 the affiliate has built seven homes across the county

in an effort to eliminate sub-standard housing.

With upcoming builds slated for Greenwood, Franklin and Edinburgh, the affiliate is excited to extend its reach and lift up hard working families to an opportunity of home ownership.
